

Sermon Notes: "Supernatural Love"
Matthew 5:43-48
2.23.25

#### **Historical Context:**

The command to love is from Leviticus 19:18, but the command to hate is found nowhere in Scripture. Human reason <u>tainted</u> by depravity made the logical leap that if you were to love your neighbor, there must be non-neighborly people - namely, your enemies - who must be <u>hated</u>. — Chuck Swindoll

#### **Understanding Supernatural Love:**

- Agape: The love of God for humankind that is <u>unconditional</u> and <u>sacrificial</u>.
- It is <u>given</u> from the Father, we <u>see</u> it in Jesus, and <u>experience</u> it through the Holy Spirit... yet the Church has been given the task of <u>revealing</u> it to the lost and broken world.

#### **How to Love our Enemies:**

- Pray for them (vs44)
- Show them the same general grace and mercy as God does (5:45)
- Be <u>friendly</u> first (vs47)

#### Big Idea:

When Jesus calls us to love our enemies, He's not just giving us a difficult command - He's <u>inviting</u> us to demonstrate the miracle of our new creation in <u>Him</u>.

# Being "Perfect":

- It comes from the root word "telos" [τέλος] which means "end, goal, purpose, or completion." The most literal translation would be "reaching its end" or "arriving at its intended goal."
- When Jesus calls us to be "perfect," He's not demanding divine, <u>flawless</u> behavior. He's calling us to grow into spiritual maturity where our love becomes <u>complete</u> loving both friend and enemy, just as God has does.

# So What?

- It's <u>Easy</u>.
- It's too Hard.
- It's Impossible.

# For Study, Reflection, Discussion:

1. Review the sermon notes from Sunday. Was there a particular point that stuck with you? What was it and why did it resonate with you?

# Read Matthew 5:43-48

- 2. When Jesus commands, "Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you" (v.44), is there anyone who comes to mind? If not, when was the last time you showed kindness to someone who has hurt you or opposed your faith? Have you prayed for them lately?
- 3. Looking at verse 45, how does God demonstrate His love for both the righteous and unrighteous? How can we mirror this in our own lives?
- 4. Jesus points out that even tax collectors love those who love them (v.46). In what ways might our love still be operating at the "tax collector level"?
- 5. When Jesus asks, "What are you doing more than others?" (v.47), how would you answer Him today?
- **6.** As we consider being "perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect" (v.48), where do you see yourself growing toward this complete, mature love?

# **Specific Action Step:**

**This week:** Identify one person who has opposed or hurt you. Choose one specific way to show them kindness - not to change them, but to fulfill your purpose as God's child. It might be as simple as a genuine greeting, offering help, or speaking well of them to others.
